FIRST AID KIT
<i>First aid book.</i>
<i>Conforming bandages (3" x 5")</i>
<i>Absorbent gauze pads (4" x 4")</i>
<i>Ace wrap (self stick is best)</i>
<i>Cotton tips (one box)</i>
<i>Antiseptic wipes (one box)</i>
<i>Emollient Cream (neosporin, vaseline)</i>
<i>Tweezers</i>
<i>Scissors</i>
<i>Instant cold pack</i>
<i>Heavy duty gloves</i>
<i>Latex disposable gloves (several pairs)</i>
<i>Kwik Stop or cornstarch to stop bleeding</i>
<i>Veterinary & immunization records.</i>
<i>One week supply of medication.</i>
Store this kit along with your other supplies in an easily accessible place



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DISASTER PREPAREDNESS SHOPPING FOR YOUR PET

	DOGS	CATS	BIRDS	OTHER
FOOD	Have at least a 1 week supply (for each dog) of your dogs normally used brand of food. Buy pop-top canned food small enough to use for one feeding. Store food in an airtight, waterproof container. Include a feeding dish & rotate your stock for freshness.	Have at least a 1 week supply (for each cat) of your cats normally used brand of food. Buy pop-top canned food small enough to use for one feeding. Store food in an airtight, waterproof container. Include a feeding dish and rotate your stock for freshness.	Have at least a 1 week supply (for each bird) of your birds normally used brand of food. Store food in an airtight, waterproof container. Include a feeding dish as well as any other supplies (i.e., cage litter, cuddlebones, cage cover, etc.).	Have at least a 1 week supply of non-perishable food for your rabbit, reptile, rodent, fish, etc. Consider heat source options (battery operated heat lamp or several disposable heat packs). You'd need substrate for reptiles, litter for rabbits & rodents, an airhose w/a small air pump would be ideal for fish.
WATER	Have enough water to last 1 week for each dog. Rotate to insure freshness & include a water dish.	Have enough water to last 1 week for each cat. Rotate to insure freshness & include a water dish or hanging water bottle for carrier/crate.	Have a 2 week supply, Store water in a dark place & rotate once a month. Have an extra seed/water bowl.	Have enough water to last 1 week. Rabbits/rodents may need a hanging water bottle, fish would benefit from Stress Coat/Novaqua, etc. Reptiles will need a water bowl at the least.
IDENTIFICATION	Collar & tags. Spare tag for temporary address & phone # Proper fitting harness & leash for walking. A current photo of your pet.	Collar & tags. Spare tag for temporary address & phone #. Proper fitting harness & leash for walking. A current photo of your pet.	Picture of your bird, with you in it to validate ownership. You may want to microchip your bird for permanent identification.	Picture of your pet with a description in case small identifying markings aren't easily seen in photo depending upon pet.
CONTAINMENT	Keep a comfortable size carrier/crate for each dog ready at all times. Include chain & stake, especially if dog is large. Make sure area is clear of anything harmful when staking pet.	Keep a comfortable size carrier/crate for each cat ready at all times. Insure that there is room for food, water dishes and a small litter box.	Be sure the cage is secure. All opening should be very securely fastened. Keep a pair of pliers w/ your kit to make any needed repairs. Include a net with your supplies.	This will vary depending upon the type and need of your specific pet, but consider a carrier/crate for rabbits & turtles/tortoises, etc. A bowl & lid or ice chest (w/holes for oxygen) for fish. Even a regular or plastic shoe box (w/holes for oxygen will work for reptiles, etc.
SANITATION	Scooper & plastic bags for disposal.	Small litter box (or at least 7 cardboard/disposable), litter for at least one week, scooper, plastic bags.	Disinfectant, paper towels, two week supply of cage bottom liner and/or litter.	Disinfectant, paper towels, substrate/litter (rabbits, rodents, reptiles, etc.), net and extra bowl/container for use during cleaning of primary bowl/container.
CLEANING	Small container of dish soap & paper towels for cleaning of dishes.			
MISC	Batteries, flashlight, bungee cords, favorite toys or bedding, treats, etc. are also things to consider having on hand.

Equine Emergency Fire Plan

Maintain a 'Fire Cache" or TOOLS to have on hand

- *LADDER long enough to reach barn roof in case of roof fire
- *GARDEN HOSE pre-connected long enough to reach around structures with spray nozzle.
- *SHOVEL to clear vegetation
- *WATER buckets
- *RADIO battery powered to monitor news reports & emergency evacuation broadcasts.

Keep these items together and accessible. Inform everyone who lives, works, or boards at your barn, of where they are and what to do.

Prepare an EVACUATION KIT-Essential Items for First 24 Hours

- *TRASH BARREL, wheeled with lid to hold the following items:
- *WATER BUCKET(S)
- *HAY NET
- *HALTER/LEAD ROPE: Breakaway halter w/clip-on, ID/long lead and 3 foot short lead.
- *MEDICATIONS and First Aid items.
- *FLASHLIGHT – SCISSORS – WIRECUTTERS – KNIFE
- *SHEETS/BLANKETS – Cotton (no nylon or plastic)
- *BRUSH – HOOF PICK
- *RADIO w/EXTRA BATTERIES

List additional items below:

DO IT NOW! Take these precautions w/in the next 24 hours!!!

FIRE SAFE GEAR

- *AVOID synthetic, nylon or plastic halters and lead ropes.
- *AVOID nylon sheets, fly masks; they can melt and cause serious burns to horse and handler.
- * USE leather halters and cotton leads.

REDUCE FIRE HAZARDS

- *NO SMOKING signs posted in barn and around all related areas
- *GASOLINE, paint, solvents, other flammable materials – Store in approved safety containers away from occupied structures.
- *HAY, straw, shavings, wood and all combustible materials. Keep all in one area. Clean up any spills.
- *RAKE perimeters. CLEAR WEEDS from equipment storage area areas.
- *CREATE WIDE FIRE BREAK around all structures.
- * WATER HOSES of adequate length connected at strategic locations at all times.

FIRE!!! MOVE NOW!!!

- *BE SAFE – Remain calm and alert. Think clearly and act.
- *PAY ATTENTION to conditions and fire behavior. Watch for sudden change in wind direction or speed, dramatic change in temperature or humidity, smoke, ash or burning embers falling around you.
- *POST LOOKOUT for possible danger.
- *ESCAPE ROUTES – Identify two from your property and point vehicles in the direction of the first escape route.
- *COMMUNICATION – Maintain constant contact with your helpers. Give simple, clear instructions and confirm that you are understood.
- * LISTEN & COOPERATE w/Fire & Law Enforcement Officers.
